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

Saint Anthony's Science and Research Program

Under the direction of faculty member Mr. Paul Paino, thirty-five of our most serious science students work on individual or team research projects addressing a "real world" problem, established goals, and stated objectives. Each original experiment allows our students to gather data, report results and draw meaningful conclusions. Their findings are fascinating and relevant, and the implications of their studies add, significantly, to our existing body of scientific knowledge. Advancing through the rigors of the program allows our students to compete in national science competitions such as the Siemens Competition, the Intel Science Talent Search, Junior Science and Humanities Symposium, and the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair.

Friarquest Senior Projects 2012-13



This research analyzes the effects of attending aftercare on the academic performance and behavior of elementary school students. The New York State Mathematics Test scores, the New York State English Language Arts Test scores, and teacher-generated behavioral scores assigned to students by their teachers for placement purposes were compared between third, fourth, and fifth grade students enrolled in aftercare and those students not enrolled in aftercare. The results show that there is no significant difference between the academic performance and behavior of children in aftercare and those of children not in aftercare. The results also show that girls demonstrate significantly better classroom behavior than boys.



When high-speed particles pass through a substance faster than light passes through that substance, they emit a form of radiation known as Cherenkov light, or Cherenkov radiation. Cherenkov radiation can be measured by finding the angle between the particle and the reflected ray. To find this angle, special mirrors in the detector must be used. These mirrors are made in a vacuum chamber in an attempt to prevent oxygen build-up on the surface. When aluminum oxide forms on the surface, the ray of reflected light is partially absorbed by the mirror. The goal was to remove oxygencontaining gases from the vacuum chamber in which the mirrors were being made. It was hypothesized that by filling the vacuum chamber with argon, a non-reactive gas, and then evacuating the chamber, much of the oxygen-containing gas could be removed. After performing several trials and filling the vacuum chamber with various amounts of argon, it was concluded that the argon was changing the chemical composition of the internal environment.

Aftercare Aftereffects: A Gender-Based Analysis of the Effects of Aftercare on the Academic Performance and Behavior of Elementary School Students

Process versus Goal Orientation: A Cross-Sectional Analysis of the Attitudes and Behaviors of Adolescent Males and Females

Research on adolescent focus and source of motivation suggests that goal oriented students who fixate on outcome and future implications experience greater levels of stress than those who enjoy the process of their endeavors. This study was conducted to determine whether or not this trend is valid and if there is a significant difference in achievement between adolescents possessing each orientation. The participants in the study (79 high school students) completed a survey designed to evaluate each participant's orientation and level of stress. The survey included a Likert scale containing twelve statements covering topics from academics, to athletics, to daily stress and anxiety. The study found that there was a significant difference between the stress levels reported by process and goal oriented students, and that females reported significantly higher levels of stress than males.



ABBY COLASACCO

Does Politics Run in Families? A Comparison of the Political Knowledge and Political Interest between Adolescent Children and their Parents.

This project examined the relationships between political knowledge, interest in politics and age. Adolescent students and their parents were asked to respond to a series of items designed to create a "political profile". A twenty-question quiz consisting of questions related to political facts and events was used to assess knowledge, and a ten item Likert Scale was used to measure attitudes toward politics in general. Results indicate that there is a significant difference between the responses of adults and adolescents in both political knowledge and attitude toward politics. Adults reported higher scores in both categories. No significant gender effects were reported.



JACK MCWILLIAMS

Ignorance is Bliss: The Emotional Effects of the News and Desensitization in Adults and Teenagers

This project examined and analyzed relationships between reported levels of sensitivity and media exposure. Test subjects were given a survey that contained a passage from a news article pertaining to a local tragedy. They were asked to answer thirty questions: ten pertaining to the newspaper passage, ten pertaining to their level of media exposure, and ten that were designed to measure their level of sensitivity in general. Each subgroup was scored and analyzed individually. Upon analysis, two statistically significant relationships emerged. The older subjects reported high levels of media exposure and subjects who reported high levels of media exposure also reported high levels of sensitivity.



MALLORY RUTIGLIANO

The Nose Knows: Exploring the Relationship between Sense of Smell and Short-term and Long-term Memory

This research project seeks to identify a relationship between the sense of smell and memory. A group of subjects was asked to memorize a list of twenty words (two-syllable nouns) and recall them eighty seconds later. The next day the same subjects were asked to recall as many words as possible from the day before without seeing the list again. This test was repeated while the subjects smelled peppermint. It was hypothesized that the scent would improve the subjects' ability to recall the words both in the short and long term. The performance of subjects on the memory test did not improve. In fact, their ability to recall was diminished under the experimental conditions. Several intervening factors may have been introduced and the results are presently inconclusive.



CONOR HAYES

We Still Have the Right to Remain Silent: Has Freedom of Speech Contributed to the Moral Decay of American Society?

Current research indicates that the media can have a negative effect on American society and culture. This study examined four sample populations: adolescent, adult, male, and female. The experiment compared responses from the adolescent population to the adult population and responses from the males to the females. All of the participants (163) completed a survey that allowed us to measure the extent to which they believed that the media was inappropriate and contributed to the overall decadence of our modern society. The subjects were asked to complete a Likert Scale based Survey including ten statements regarding the media and ten statements regarding society. Results indicate that the adult members of the population, especially females, reported that the media is inappropriate. However, none of the sample populations reported that society was in a state of moral decay.



AMY WANG

Directing Keratinocyte and Fibroblast Cell Migration in Wound Healing Using PMMA Substrates

Wound healing involves the restoration of tissue as a response to injury. The process itself mainly revolves around the two primary skin cell types, keratinocytes and fibroblasts. This research addresses these two types of cells in an attempt to expand our knowledge on the wound healing process and to find innovative ways to create specialized polymer scaffolds designed for wound healing purposes. As ample research had already been conducted on fibroblasts, but not on keratinocytes, we focused our study on how keratinocytes migrate and respond to different polymer substrates.



JAMES PALMERI

Beating the Game: An Analysis of a Mathematical Game of Strategy

This project introduces and analyzes "One Away", a two-player mathematical game of strategy. The game involves a certain property of the integers; players add one to or subtract one from an integer and divide by two until reaching another odd number. The player who reaches the number one wins. This paper explores strategies for winning "One Away" and predicts, assuming perfect play from both players, which player will win.

The Effects of Glucose and Substrate Mechanics on mTG Cross-linked Gelatin Hydrogel with Respect to Cell Migration and Angiogenesis

Over 6.5 million people annually experience chronic wounds, thus an efficient, reliable treatment is necessary for wound healing. Gelatin hydrogels have biodegradable and biocompatible properties making them ideal as scaffolds. However, the gelatin's helical bonds are reversible and lead to degradation of the substrate, necessitating the addition of crosslinkers to create permanent, temperature resistant bonds. Microbial transglutaminase (mTG), an enzyme used in the food industry, served this purpose and impacted the mechanics of the gel-a higher mTG ratio increased the linear viscoelastic curve during rheological analysis indicating a stiff gel. The addition of glucose, serving as a diabetic simulation, provided similar results in that the gel was stronger and more heat resistant. In this study, fibroblast cell behaviors were also observed including migration and angiogenesis. The fibroblasts migrated more guickly on stiffer gels, and endothelial cells began to organize into different structures, endothelial sheaths and lattices, also depending on the gel's surface.



CAROLINE SPIEZIO

What is the Cost of Good Health? An Analysis of the Correlation Between Income and Health

Research was conducted regarding the correlation between an individual's average yearly income and his or her overall fitness and well-being. The purpose of this study is to determine whether or not a lack of wealth can prevent an individual from reaching a high level of overall health. The participants in the study included one hundred high school students' parents, fifty high school faculty members, and fifty randomly selected individuals. Participants were asked to complete a form of consent, followed by a short five to ten minute survey. The survey included a short section inquiring about average income, marital status, number of children, gender, and age. A second portion of the survey asked questions on the individual's daily eating and exercise habits, and whether or not cost affected their decision making when choosing between healthy and non-healthy options. The results indicate that wealthier individuals are more likely to have a healthy diet and maintain regular exercise routines.



JOHN RISBERGS

Does The Apple Fall Far From the Tree? An Examination of the Attitude of Adolescents and their Parents Toward Honest Behavior

Research on morality and ethics suggests that behavioral tendencies can be attributed to gender and role within a family. This study was conducted to determine who is more likely to display honest behavior, children or their parents. The participants in this study (seventy-five adolescents and their parents) were presented with fifteen "real life" scenarios and were asked to express their opinion regarding each using a four-item Likert scale. A cumulative mean was calculated for each sample group and means were statistically compared using a t-test. Results indicate that adults, especially female adults, favor honest behavior in the majority of the cases examined.



ANGELIKA ROTHBERG

Accelerator Mass Spectrometry in Radiocarbon Dating

The goal of this project was to use wood shavings from a tree and, through a series of chemical processes, convert the wood into a pure graphite sample intended for use as a target for the beam in a Van de Graff generator. Graphite samples will be tested later for the ratio of C12 and C14 using the van de Graff generator and a particle counter. Ultimately, the age of the specimen was determined through radiocarbon dating. The results indicated that the procedure was reliable and repeatable.



SARAH PARENTE

Autism, Self-Stimulatory Behavior, and the Effects of Sensory Toys

This project aims to quantify the effects of sensory toys on children with autism. Self-stimulatory behavior can be defined as repetitive movements of the body and random movement of objects. Reduction or elimination of these behaviors offers autistic children with a more comfortable and productive learning environment. Sensory toys that targeted sight, sound, and touch were used in the study. Children with autism were observed in a controlled environment as they played with these toys. Changes in self-stimulatory behaviors in the presence of sensory integration and without were observed and measured. The information gained through this study can be used in developing countries where resources available to autistic children are scarce.



RYAN KRAMER

Is Moneyball Reality? A Quantitative Analysis of Market Size, Attendance Rates, Payroll, and Performance in Major League Baseball

In this project, data regarding market size, payroll, attendance rate, and performance of all Major League Baseball teams was collected, examined and analyzed. Scatterplot graphs and linear regression analyses were used to determine correlations. A strong correlation between payroll and attendance rate was found. A strong correlation was also found between market size and payroll. Contrary to popular belief, there was no correlation between payroll and performance. This research lends support to the belief that small market teams can survive and do not have to relocate to make money or find fan support.



Heads Up! An Examination of the Attitudes of Adolescents and Adults Toward Concussion Prevention and Treatment


Previous concussion research emphasizes physical aspects as opposed to the behavioral science impacts. The study was conducted in an attempt to determine whether or not a discrepancy exists between the factual knowledge and opinionated views regarding concussion prevention, treatment, and recovery as reported by the three subject groups: parents, athletes, and coaches. This study found that the order of concussion factual knowledge from most to least is coaches, parents, and then athletes. The study also confirmed the belief that the degree of opinions from reckless to cautious is athletes, coaches, and then parents. There is a significant disparity reported amongst the three groups, suggesting that coaches and parents have similar views while athletes oppose them and stand alone.

The team consisting of Senior Ryan Kramer, Senior Captain Michael Cox, Sophomore Sean McShane and Senior Karl Palmquist and Alternates Senior Sarah Rauchenberger and Freshman Gavin McGuire were cheered on by a very enthusiastic audience. T - 2 months and counting... Saint Anthony's Rocket & Aviation Club & S.T.E.M.

The acronym S.T.E.M. stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. Use of the word "STEM" emphasizes the connection points and overlap among these areas of study. So what's the big deal?

It's not just that it's another great sounding buzzword. Throughout the country more and more schools and universities are touting their involvement in STEM related projects. Why? Well, the reason is quite important and quite simple. In America today, jobs in STEM-related fields are among the fastest growing careers. Why? Issues facing our nation and the world today have explicit connections to STEM fields. Issues such as the energy crisis, the threat of terrorism, and the national healthcare debate will require the ability to combine their knowledge of science and math to address and solve these issues. The ability for the United States to compete in a global economy will depend on our ability to produce a highly qualified generation of researchers, workers and teachers in the widespread fields of science, engineering and technology.

Recently, teachers from the Saint Anthony's High School Science and Math departments have combined their talents and efforts to help create new initiatives at the school such as the Rocket and Aviation Club and the Science Research Program. These new programs have given our talented students a unique opportunity to pursue their interest in significant STEM related projects. In the past year alone, the North American Space Agency (NASA) has awarded a grant to eight members of the schools award winning Rocket and Aviation club. The students will be working with NASA engineers to build a high-powered rocket that will fly one mile high and almost break the sound barrier. The 8-foot rocket will also contain a scientific payload bay that will carry a scientific experiment that will test the effects of sudden changes of pressure and temperature on mitotic cell division in certain plants and protists. The research program here at Saint Anthony's will then enter this experiment into the prestigious Siemens Competition in Math, Science and Technology. The rocket will be launched in Huntsville, Alabama this April at NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center.

The combination of these new programs with the talents of our students and teachers will help to continue to keep Saint Anthony's High School on the cutting-edge of secondary school education. 
DARAH MCCLOUD


SHI (JOSEPH) GE




ELIZABETH KELSCH

October 29th, 2012. After weeks of weathermen forecasting the "perfect storm", Hurricane Sandy arrived. The worst storm that the East Coast has seen in decades, the storm profoundly affected all Long Islanders. Lack of electricity and running water, loss of cars and homes, hours long gas lines. The Saint Anthony's building and its grounds saw much tree damage and loss of electricity.

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Upon returning to school it was determined that over 20 of our current students and their

families had been displaced. Brother Gary opened the Chapel of Our Lady of the Angels for donations of school supplies, clothing, toiletries and food. Within days of the storm our Chapel was overflowing. Through the coordinated efforts of Theology teacher Laura Giannuzzi '00 and Campus Minister Brother Vincent Adams, O.S.F., our students were able to organize the donations and make certain that Saint Anthony's families were adequately provided for. Surplus donations were distributed throughout the affected communities. Our Alumnae also stepped up to the plate and demonstrated the Franciscan ideals of serving those in need.





So many of our Alumni were involved in fire and rescue in the devastated regions. Others created opportunities to help those in need. Patrick Regan '06 had been training for years for the NYC Marathon. When the Marathon was cancelled, Pat decided to not let his training or the opportunity to help others pass him by. On November 4th, Patrick ran a full marathon in Central Park and raised over \$2000 for the Red Cross relief efforts. Many Friars were on the sidelines cheering Patrick on. Sean Rogan '05 used social media to galvanize a group of volunteers to help homeowners in the devastated areas of the South Shore. Sean was thrilled to have the Friars well represented among his group of volunteers. Friar John Bagatta '82 was moved by his young son Michael's request that his Boy Scout Troop 191 from Avondale, PA do

something to help those on Long Island. Within days of the storm John and Michael drove down with a truckload of supplies and they, with the help of Dan Bagatta '88, replenished the supplies at Saint Anthony's. The Bagattas, Sean and Patrick are just a few of the many Friars who rolled up their sleeves to assist others.

An incredible example of the kindness and compassion throughout the Franciscan community comes from a small school in Cape Girardeau, MO - Notre Dame High School. When Brother David Migliorino, O.S.F. discussed the aftermath of Sandy with his students, the kids immediately wanted to help. The students and Brother David agreed that the proceeds from the school's annual Faith Walk would be donated to Saint Anthony's. The students went well above and beyond, however, and got community members and business owners to assist them in their goal of providing for the Saint Anthony's family. Their efforts resulted in a phenomenal gift of \$40,000. As soon as the check was received, the money was used to repair damage to our building and alleviate the stress of the displaced families. 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Soon after the devastating hurricane hit Haiti back in 2010, Friar parents Christina and Rich Panetta, planned a two week mission to help those in need. That two week plan turned into six months in Dufailly, a small, rural town where Christine used her skills as a physical therapist and Rich used his skills to help rebuild homes, schools and hospitals. With the help of Haitian nationals, the two created the Yes We Can for Progress Mission so that they could help clothe, feed and educate the young in the village. The entire Panetta Family quickly became enthusiastic about the project. While working there the family met a young woman named Manna, a double amputee and her infant son Wolf. Because her living conditions were so poor, the Panettas brought the young mother and her son back home to Oakdale, NY where they were welcomed as family. Friar Alumni JP '04 and Therese '06 also made trips to Dufailly where they worked with villagers on life skills and empowerment.

Therese also recruited fellow Friar Kelly Caemmerer '06. The two knew each other as Varsity Cheerleaders throughout their time here at Saint Anthony's. Therese, a Duquesne graduate and current SUNY Stony Brook Physical Therapist student, and Kelly, who works as an EMT for Cablevision, took time off from their schooling and job to travel to Dufailly on December 17th, 2012. For eight days, the two lived in the village's tents with no running water or bathrooms. They worked with 100 young girls between the ages of 4 and 18 years old teaching them English and Kelly's specialty - crocheting. The two also distributed clothes and school supplies that they had shipped beforehand.

Although the task was challenging, both Kelly and Therese plan on making repeat trips to help the Haitian village. The Panetta family and Kelly Caemmerer are living the Franciscan ideal of service to others. 
Chad Donnelly '96 U.S. Naval Lieutenant Commander






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A Brother Needs Our Support
